Dear Members and Friends,

As I write this, we are in the midst of the appointed gospel texts for Sundays that most pastors dread. If you remember, we had 5 Sundays where the Gospel mentions bread. Speaking of bread, do you have a a favorite bread? Take a moment and imagine its smell, how it feels as you tear into it, the endorphins coursing through

your brain as you take your first bite. What was it that you imagined? Was it like the biscuits they serve at Red Lobster? Or like they *used* to serve at Ruby Tuesdays? Was it sourdough, or spicy rye? Or was it focaccia, that sponge of butter and herbs? Or maybe it was the way your mother made you toast and jelly when you were a child?

Now take that experience with bread and multiply it by a few million and you'll have an idea of what Jesus is offering you. He offered it to 5,000 people. In some gospel accounts, that's just the men in the crowd, not counting women and children. I don't know if it's possible to grasp the love Christ has for you, but Jesus meets us where we are. Instead of comparing himself to the greatest philosophers, teachers, theologians or heroes of his day, he compares himself to bread; simple, ordinary bread. It's a delicious place to start our contemplation of Christ.

THE SIGNIFICANCE OF PATRIOT DAY

Three months after the 2001 terrorist attacks, Congress approved a joint resolution designating September 11 as Patriot Day. Every year, we pause to remember the lives lost and changed on that autumn morning.

The resolution requests that each year the president issue a proclamation calling on the American people and state and local governments to observe the day with appropriate activities. Those include remembrance services, candlelight vigils, moments of silence and flying the U.S. flag at half-staff.

In his 2023 proclamation President Biden said, "Together, may we continue to demonstrate that the rights and freedoms that those terrorists sought to destroy on September 11, 2001, remain unwavering — strengthened by generations of Americans who have dared all and risked all to defend, protect and preserve our democracy."

PARISH NURSING NOTES

"Immunotherapy to Treat Cancer" September 2024 Peggy Saylor, RN

I hope everyone had a wonderful summer! As I thought about what topic to write on for this month's newsletter, I decided to explore the subject of immunotherapy for treatment of cancer. Several individuals have talked to me about immunotherapy and I realized that I didn't know exactly what immunotherapy was.

Immunotherapy has been approved to treat many types of cancer but still is not as widely used as surgery, radiation and chemotherapy.

Immunotherapy is a cancer treatment that helps your own immune system fight cancer. It is known as a type of biological therapy meaning that it uses substances made from living organisms to treat cancer.

Our immune system normally detects and destroys abnormal cells and seems to prevent or curb the growth of many cancers. Immune cells called tumor-infiltrating lymphocytes or TILS are sometimes found in and around tumors and are a sign that our immune system is responding to the tumor. Immunotherapy helps the immune system to better act against cancer.

There are several types of immunotherapy used to treat cancer. Immune checkpoint inhibitors, T-cell transfer therapy, monoclonal antibodies, treatment vaccines and immune system modulators are described in further detail in the article that I listed at the bottom of this article.

Immunotherapy can be given intravenously, by mouth, or topical in a cream which is sometimes used in very early skin cancer. Most treatments can be done in a doctor's office, clinic or outpatient unit in a hospital. The duration of treatment varies by the type of treatment you receive and how your body reacts to it. Some types of immunotherapy are given in cycles which include a period of rest to give your body a chance to recover, respond to the treatment and build new healthy cells.

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As with most types of treatments, there are side effects with immunotherapy as your immune system is revved-up to act against cancer which also acts against healthy cells and tissues in your body. Health care providers can help patients to manage the side effects that may occur.

Researchers continue to focus on ways to improve immunotherapy for cancer treatment to find solutions to resistance, find ways to predict one's response to treatment and reduce side effects. More detailed information can be found on the National Cancer Institute's website.



A Tapestry of Love:

Unveiling the Impact of Our Quilting Ministries



The results are in for our Quilt Survey - and it is AMAZING the wonderful gifts of comfort and love that our congregations across the Synod share with others. Each year more than 1000 quilts, lap blankets, baby quilts and other blankets are made and donated to a host of charities from the 17 congregations who shared their stories. And the wonderful stories we have to tell! The **oldest** quilting ministry was shared by **Trinity Ev. Lutheran in Lehighton** - Trinity Knotters. They started in 1965 from an article about using coats and suits to make quilts. Initially, they started sewing at home and then moved into Luther Hall where they still meet today. They have a brick on the Good Samaritan Plaza at the Baltimore LWR Headquarters. Their quilts are shared with Lutheran World Relief (LWR) and locally for graduating students, Carbon County Action Committee, Sanctuary for Veterans and

others. In addition to quilts, they make baby, personal care and school kits for LWR. Our Quilting groups have posted some very impressive numbers! The most annual quilt volume was posted by **Christ**

Lutheran in Hellertown providing 180 quilts and lap quilts to a variety of organizations including Project Linus, Hospice, Habitat for Humanity, their internal faith community and fundraising. St. James Lutheran in Coopersburg – started in 2013 - reported 155 annual quilts donated to Turning Point, Bethany Ministries and to LWR prior to the pandemic. They have also made baby and personal care kits for LWR. St. John's Lutheran in Slatington reported 135 quilts and lap robes donated to LWR and to Chemo Bag, Gracedale, Topton Lutheran Home, Ripple, Sayre Center for Children, Kids Peace, Light House and Rescue Mission. St. John's Lutheran in Hamburg reported 100 quilts donated to LWR and the Topton Home.



Our Quilters are very talented, making a host of additional items to benefit our community. **Trinity Ev. Lutheran in Topton** – Compassionate

Crafters - makes a wide variety of crafts including fidget blankets and sleeves, crafters critters, prayer blankets lap and shawls in addition to quilts! Their handmade items are donated to LWR, Lutheran Home, Lehigh Valley and St. Luke's Hospitals and Arden Court. Newly started in 2022, the

Compassionate Crafters donated 114 items that year and 218 items in 2023!

Our quilts are shared near and far – across the USA and around the world.

St. Peter's Ev. Lutheran in Reinerton – Tyers of Comfort - have made over 2000 quilts since their start in 1999. Among the groups to whom they

donate quilts is the Navajo Lutheran Mission in AZ and LWR. The group is led Kathryn Lewis, by founder and chairperson, who is 90 years old and going **Tyers** strong! Comfort also have a sidewalk brick at the LWR Warehouse in Maryland. These are just a few of the stories

from our Quilting family across the Synod and there are more stories to tell from the rest of the groups – we will include them next time.
