Dear Members and Friends,

The last Sunday in October is Reformation Sunday. The events of the Reformation did not reveal anything new. They only uncovered what was part of Christian teaching to begin with that had become forgotten or hidden over the years by Church practices and traditions that had developed. Though revolutionary for their time,

the tenets of the Reformation are important parts of the life of the Protestant church today. Here are a few:

READING THE BIBLE – In the time of the Reformation, only the church leaders read and had access to the Bible. Parishioners only listened to church leaders read the Bible aloud in church in Latin, which made it difficult for everyday people to know and understand the Scripture. Martin Luther translated the Bible into German and copies were printed and distributed so that people in his country could read the Bible on their own in their own language.

MUSIC – The Reformation brought music and singing to the people in the pews. Singing had been reserved for church leaders, who mainly chanted in Latin. Martin Luther composed 36 hymns that were based on folk melodies people already knew and published a hymnbook that parishioners could use in church to sing songs in unison and in harmony as a part of the liturgy of worship.

TABLE TALK – When Martin Luther served as a professor at the University of Wittenberg, he did not leave the teaching in the school buildings, but invited his students to join him around the dinner table with his family to talk about issues related to the Christian life, the Church and the Bible.

TEACHING – When Martin Luther traveled around to other churches, he was surprised to discover that many people were not familiar with the most basic teaching of the Church. So he wrote the Small Catechism for parents to use in their homes to teach their children these six chief parts: the Ten Commandments, the Apostles' Creed, the Lord's Prayer, Baptism, the Office of the Keys and Confession and the Lord's Supper.

VOCATION – In Luther's day, there was a hierarchy in work that people did. The clergy and others who worked in the church were at the top rung of society and those who were maids or servants were stationed at the bottom rung. But Luther explained that in the eyes of God, all

people were equal, no matter what their occupation. Vocation became a much broader term in the Reformation to mean being forgiven by God to serve others in response to his love for us. This idea of our "calling" in the name of Christ elevated the status of the common laborer and brought about a greater sense of the inherent worth of a person, not connected to a person's specific day job.

Join us on Sunday, October 27th to celebrate the Reformation.

VETERANS DAY SALUTE

After fighting in World War II, Luther Bergeland wasn't done serving his country — or his God. The Minnesota farm boy, who "came back to faith" during combat, later served for decades as a military chaplain. For his actions in the field in Korea, Bergeland was awarded the Bronze Star. Then during Vietnam, he served in the Army Reserves in Colorado, tasked with informing family members about soldiers' deaths.

Despite the challenges, Bergeland embraces the special role he was able to play for four decades, sharing Jesus and his love with countless people. "That's what we did, preaching and reaching out to people," he told a reporter. "I always liked the military very much because it just did a lot for me, and I hope I did a lot for it."

On Veterans Day, we salute Bergeland and all the men and women who selflessly serve.

PARISH NURSING NOTES

As we age our risk of falling increases. We slowly lose our strength and balancing skills. One in 4 people age 65 or older will have a fall each year. The consequences can cause disability, fractures, or the need for hospitalization. There are some steps you can take to help decrease your risk of falling.

Use night lights and tidy up the environment around the areas you walk through. Keep a flashlight and charged phone by your bedside in case of power outage or emergency. It's very easy to trip or slip on throw rugs. It's best to remove them, fasten them to the floor or use non-skid mats. When a new medication is started, talk with your health care provider about the side effects. Continue your scheduled wellness visits including eye exams and hearing exams as well. If you get dizzy when getting up, get up slowly and stand only after the dizziness has subsided. Let your physician know that you are experiencing dizziness. Use aids if needed to help with your activities (like a cane, walker or wheelchair). Place side rails bedside your toilet and in your shower if possible. If you fall frequently there are alert buttons one can wear to call for help.

There are things we can do to help maintain our balance and mobility including strength training and balance exercises. There are many balance and strength training exercises on the internet appropriate for different age groups. You can also take balance classes or strength training classes. It's surprising how doing a little something almost everyday can keep us in better condition to face the aging process. Enjoy the beautiful fall!



WHAT YOUR HEART CLAMORS TO DO

We often speak of pastors as having a divine "calling." God gives them a strong sense of purpose for a specific holy role, like how Old Testament prophets were called to bring messages to God's people. But what about the rest of us? Is teaching, practicing medicine, being a plumber, writing or another non-church job also a "call"?

Martin Luther and others have said we should seek work that benefits others and for which God has given us talent. We should also treat any good work we do as a calling — be it cleaning a house or school, mending a broken leg or torn garment, or (as Luther mentioned a *father* doing — in the 1500s!) changing a baby's diaper.

Dorothy Sayers wrote that "work is not primarily a thing one does to live, but the thing one lives to do," and that "we should clamor to be engaged in work that [is] worth doing, and in which we [can] take pride." What work does your heart clamor to do? In other words, what is *your* divine call?

This means, if you would like the Pastor to know you are hospitalized on the weekend, please call the church office or the Pastor.

SIMPLE BUT LIFESAVING


In early 2024, Beatrice Johnson became deathly ill in hours. An upset stomach became dangerously low blood pressure; it turned out flesheating bacteria had attacked her entire body. When Johnson's kidneys started failing, she was put on life support. In a last-ditch effort, doctors added sodium bicarbonate — baking soda — to her IV. Within hours Johnson was noticeably improved, and she left the hospital a month later. "I never thought something so simple would save my life," she said.

Another lifesaver many people find too simple is God's grace. We quip, "If something seems too good to be true, it probably is," and "Nothing in life is free." We're used to payments or paybacks. We balk if a friend offers to buy our lunch. When a neighbor brings us homemade cookies, we don't dare return the plate empty.

So how can something as huge and *holy* as salvation be a free gift from God? Don't we need to *do* something to earn it: follow the 10 Commandments? go to church? live a "godly" life?

All those things are good to do, but the key is to do them as *thanks* for God's gift of salvation, not to earn it. Jesus loves you and assures you of eternal life. Just accept the gift! If that seems simple, it's because it is — but it will also save your life.

NORTHEASTERN PENNSYLVANIA SYNOD MONTHLY NEWSLETTER

LWR Ingathering: Can you believe we filled the Truck!



On Saturday, September 21, the NEPA Synod hosted our first local Lutheran World Relief (LWR) Ingathering to collect Mission Quilts and Kits destined for the Baltimore warehouse. Congregations collect donations and assemble various LWR kits – Personal Care, School, Baby Care or Fabric kits – for their "God's Work. Our Hands." service projects. Quilts are typically made all year long with a celebration Blessing of the Quilts and Kits through the fall season. Our LWR Ingathering was scheduled to coincide with these activities, to collect donations and coordinate transportation to the Baltimore warehouse. As a new venture, we were very curious to see the turnout from local churches.

As is typical with our Synod, the response was AMAZING! During our 3 hour collection period, cars, trucks and vans kept coming filled with as many boxes as could be carried! Most congregations brought Personal Care Kits totaling 570 kits from Trinity Lutheran in Robesonia, St. John's Lutheran in Stroudsburg, Trinity Lutheran in Topton, Trinity Lutheran in Perkasie, Zion Lutheran in Womelsdorf, Emmanuel's Lutheran in Emmanuelville and St. John's Lutheran in Allentown. The largest quantity donated were School Kits totaling 595 kits from Zion Lutheran in Womelsdorf, Good Shepherd Lutheran in Northampton and St. Stephen's Lutheran in Bethlehem. Fifty-four (54) Mission Quilts were collected from St. John's Lutheran in Slatington, St. Paul's Lutheran in Douglassville and St. John's Lutheran in Allentown. Fourteen (14) Baby Care kits were collected from St. John's Lutheran in Allentown.

On October 12, through the generous donation of Kristi Parcel-Smith of Remax in Allentown, we drove her company's truck to





Christ Lutheran Church in Reading to collect donations from three additional churches. We added more boxes containing 207 Mission Quilts from Reformation Lutheran in Reading and Robeson Lutheran in Plowville. We also added 110 Personal Care Kits from Nativity Lutheran in Reading and St. Paul's in Reading. We continued our journey on to Bergstrasse Lutheran Church in Ephrata where volunteers loaded our boxes onto a tractor-trailer headed to Baltimore on Monday, October 14. What an amazing outpouring of love for our neighbors in need!

Typically, LWR Quilts and Kits are sent around the world. Following Hurricane Helene, LWR Quilts and Personal Care Kits are being distributed throughout the devastated areas in the Carolinas and Georgia. Donations at our Ingathering represent only a portion of the total contributions to LWR from our Synod, as some congregations ship their donations directly to the Baltimore warehouse or attend a closer Ingathering. Several of our churches bring their donations to an Ingathering in Auburn, PA, and three churches delivered their donations directly to Bergstrasse Church.
