Dear Members and Friends,

Next to our Lord's resurrection on Easter, the Epiphany revelation of God to the people of the world is an equally mindboggling, history-changing event. Yet today little is made of the Epiphany revelation of the Savior to an international group of wise men. In the western world all our attention goes to the heart-warming scenes of Christmas.

Compared with Christmas twelve days earlier, the Day of Epiphany is a celebration especially for the non-Jewish people of the world. But like them, we also long for God to come and set the world right.

Epiphany celebrates the discovery that, indeed, a Savior has come to us – the Lord himself – revealing the unimaginable depth of his love.

- The magi discovered that revelation in a baby lying in a humble manger under a majestic star.
- John the Baptizer hears that revelation in a heavenly voice as he officiates at Jesus' baptism
- And a merry wedding party at Cana experienced that revelation with the delivery of a special gift of wine by guest Jesus of Nazareth.

Parties and banquets mark Epiphany in England, where it is known as Twelfth Night, a grand climax to the Christmas season.

In Italy, France and Hispanic countries it is the wise men, not Santa, who bring holiday gifts on Epiphany, not Christmas. Spanish children leave their shoes outside overnight with straw for the camels and food for "the kings" who leave behind treats for them.

And in Protestant churches, the Season of Epiphany ends with the celebration of Christ's Transfiguration, a moment in which still brighter glory is revealed to us in our Lord.

This year, as the weeks of the Epiphany season "wind down" from the frantic pitch of Christmas to the quiet vision of Transfiguration, let the miracle sink in: God has shown himself at last! And the news is good!

PARISH NURSING NOTES

"Walking Pneumonia in Children" Peggy Saylor, RN

According to recent reports from the CDC, the rate of cases of "walking pneumonia" has been rising. Known as Mycoplasma pneumonia, "walking pneumonia" rates have significantly risen among children and especially in the 2-4 year age range. Experts speculate that this rise in rates may be attributed to the "immune debt" in children from the reduced rates of illnesses during the COVID pandemic. A reduced rate of exposure can lead to a weaker immune system. As the grandmother of an eleven year old who had a recent bout of "walking pneumonia", I thought it would be interesting to share the facts of this disease.

Symptoms are typically mild but can be severe as well. Symptoms include a dry cough, fever, fatigue, headache and sore throat. Some individuals will also have a loss of appetite leading to decreased nutrition and dehydration.

Treatment is determined by your health care provider but can include antibiotics, increased rest, maintaining fluid intake and staying at home until symptoms improve.

Since "walking pneumonia" is a respiratory illness, it is spread by droplets. Prevention starts with ill children staying home when sick to avoid spreading the disease, good hand washing and coughing into one's elbows. Symptoms are often attributed to just allergies but if they don't improve or start to get worse, contact your health care provider.

Hope you have a healthy winter season and just remember that Spring is only a few months away!!

MLK on what really matters



Exactly two months before his assassination, Martin Luther King Jr. preached his final sermon at Ebenezer Baptist Church in Atlanta. On February 4, 1968, the civil-rights icon spoke about how

he wanted to be remembered at his funeral. He preferred that people recall not his education or achievements but that he "tried to give his life serving others" and "tried to love somebody."

Adapting a 1952 homily by J. Wallace Hamilton, King decried the "drum major instinct — a desire to be out front, a desire to lead the parade." Humans often want to be great and first, as evidenced by the disciples James and John requesting prime seats in paradise. But King urged listeners to focus on the "reordered priorities" of Jesus, who wants us to "be first in love."

As Jesus showed, "everybody can serve," King said. Your background or status doesn't matter, as long as you have "a heart full of grace" and "a soul generated by love."

Research has shown that when a crocheted or knitted octopus was placed with the preemie, some babies in the NICU experienced better breathing and more regular heartbeats, and were less bothered by the various monitors and IVs around them. The recipient will be St. Luke's Hospital NICU, where they

Parish Code for hospitalized parishioners is 321. Please give this code when you are admitted to the hospital so the pastor can be made aware that you are a patient and can administer the pastoral care you require while you are hospitalized.

Please take note, that if you are admitted on a Thursday night, Friday, Saturday, or Sunday, the pastor will not be aware that you are hospitalized until Monday mid-morning, since the church does not have office hours on Friday, and the hospital pastoral care office is not available on Saturday or Sunday.

This means, if you would like the Pastor to know you are hospitalized on the weekend, please call the church office or the Pastor.

"Dyeing" with Christ

The Greek word *baptizo*, which means to immerse, became associated with the dyeing trade. When a cloth is immersed in dye, the union leads to an altered condition. The cloth's previous color no longer exists; it has a permanent new identity.

Baptizo, which has no English equivalent, is a spot-on description of what happens in the sacrament of baptism. When we're merged with Christ through water and the Word, we leave behind our original sinful condition. Through that union, Jesus gives us a new identity in him — so "we too may live a new life" (Romans 6:4, NIV).

Bible scholar James Montgomery Boice offered another great example of *baptizo* from, of all places, a 200 B.C. pickle recipe. Nicander, a Greek poet and physician, explained that a vegetable must first be "dipped" (*bapto*) into boiling water and then "baptized" (*baptizo*) in a vinegar solution. "Both verbs concern the immersing of vegetables in a solution, but the first is temporary," Boice writes. "The second, the act of baptizing the vegetable, produces a permanent change."

In the New Testament, *baptizo* "more often refers to our union and identification with Christ than to our water baptism," according to Boice. "Christ is saying that mere intellectual assent is not enough. There must be a union with him, a real change, like the vegetable to the pickle!" And like the cloth to the dye.


Dear WUA! Supporter,

NORTHEASTERN PENNSYLVANIA SYNOD MONTHLY NEWSLETTER

Gaining Strength Together: The Journey of NEPA Synod Cohorts

Following the Bishop's Conference in the fall of 2021 with Rev. Doug Hill (author of "Cultural Architecture"), the Synod launched its first Gaining Strength Cohort. This cohort, while initially similar to the cohorts happening across the country in the ELCA, turned out to be quite different. This cohort was comprised entirely of pastors from the NEPA Synod instead of pastors around the country. This gave the cohort the opportunity to develop deeper relationships that could continue to be supported and built up over time and in a mutual context.



While this 1st cohort was finishing in October 2023, a 2nd cohort was launched. The 2nd cohort was the first cohort to include Deacons as well as Pastors. A 3rd cohort was launched in April 2024. While each cohort has its own character based on the individual participants, there are some key similarities. Cohorts meet for a period of 18 months. They have 4 in-person retreats (fall and spring) with Zoom check-in meetings in between the retreats. Each cohort has about 10-14 Rostered Ministers in it.

They work through many of the key

principles of "Cultural Architecture" with Pastor Doug facilitating the retreats. Additionally, they discuss the Enneagram, Clifton's Strength Finders, organizational intelligence, cultural transformation, and the state of the church at present. More than that, the retreats provide intentional time to connect with one another and with God. Each day centers on Scripture and provides time for contemplative action. How can we lead congregations if we are not taking the time to practice waiting on and listening to God ourselves?

A few of the current cohort members shared their gratefulness to have time to think about shared values, contemplative action, and their own God-given strengths. Pr. Inge Williams was "also grateful to do some deeper reflection on who I am, as a child of God, knowing that we glorify God by living into our individual gifts and strengths rather than spending energy trying to 'fix' ourselves."

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Pr. Samantha Drennan shared three key take-aways she has experienced through the Gaining Strength cohort:

1) Seek to maximize strengths rather than focus on shortcomings - since I have begun to do this, I have experienced significant positive changes in my call as well as in my life in general.

2) Embrace contemplative action - as we make decisions for ourselves or for our faith communities, we must integrate contemplation and action. Before acting, make time to discern what the Spirit is already doing in, through, and around us.

3) Surrendering all outcomes to God - easier said than done sometimes! And, a vital component of the process.

The Synod is grateful that these Rostered Ministers have embraced this opportunity, are willing to be present with one another, and are being bold in leaning into the Spirit in their own lives and places of ministry.

There has been so much interest in participating in these Gaining Strength cohorts that the Synod anticipates launching another 1-2 cohorts in 2025. One of the hopes is that one of the cohorts will bring together congregations who have multiple Rostered Ministers on staff so that they can participate simultaneously. From our Living Room to a Public Faith

Dear Lehigh Mission District,

Jesus said, "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." *John 13:34–35*

The concerns brought to the December Rostered Ministers' Monthly Zoom Meeting with Bishop Christopher deForest of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod were stressful.

Why were these ministers stressed out and concerned? Because of the possible effects of the recent election.

The tense conversation creeped through my zoom screen and into my living room.

People talked about the prospect of mass deportation with the separation of immigrant families and how this will affect the church. Ministers expressed concerns for the emotional mental health for sexual abuse survivors. Others expressed concerns about affordable healthcare.

Our Lutheran churches in the mission district have two positions to take. The first is to do what the church does best in these tense moments and pray. For some, prayers help numb the decisions that led to this outcome. As people of prayer, the second position is for the church to come out of the privacy of our living room and into the public arena.

Jesus calls the church to love their neighbor.

To this end, Bishop deForest presented Eleven Points shared in consultation with other bishops:

- Stay grounded; rest is resistance
- Connect to local networks for bystander training, rapid response, sanctuary
- Reach out to vulnerable populations/members and let them know that they are not alone
- Form networks of solidarity for action
- Help families that anticipate separation (undocumented parents with citizen children) make a plan
- Connect with others throughout the synod
- Activate community organizing networks

- Focus on discipleship

It is my hope that we can join together in our public faith for our neighbors in the mission district.
