#### ASH WEDNESDAY

The Season of Lent begins with ashes and ends with alleluias. It is a season of spiritual growth, beginning on February 14<sup>th</sup> and concluding six weeks later with the brilliant white colors of Easter. The first day of Lent is Ash Wednesday named for the practice of imposing ashes, a practice that many Lutheran congregations have found quite meaningful. Ashes symbolize several aspects of our human experience. First, ashes remind us of God's condemnation of sin, as God said to Adam, "Dust you are and to dust you shall return." Second, ashes suggest cleansing and renewal. Ashes were used anciently in the absence of soap, and on Ash Wednesday ashes are a penitential substitute for water as a reminder of our Baptism. Third, ashes remind us of the shortness of human life, for one day the words "We commit his/her body to the ground; earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust" will be said over our bodies. Fourth, ashes are a symbol of repentance, as expressed in Luke 10:13 and the hymn "Savior, When in Dust to Thee." Please join us for this important service to begin the season of Lent on the morning and evening of March 5<sup>th</sup> at 10:30am and 7:00pm

#### PENNY PARTY FUNDRAISER!!



The Spring Penny Party and Basket Raffle fundraiser is scheduled for **April 5**, **2025** with doors opening at 11:30AM, and the event beginning at 1:00PM. Seating at this event is limited, so guests are encouraged to come early.

The Penny Party will include approximately 10 baskets, 10-15 gift cards, and 100-200 small items for bidding. We will sell food and beverages and there will also be a bake sale.

#### What is a Penny Party?

A Penny Party is a fundraising and social event that combines elements of raffles and silent auctions. Guests buy a set (or several sets) of numbered tickets that they use to bid on small items priced under \$1. Each ticket equals one bid. Guests are seated at tables that are inter-connected, and view items on a tray as it is slid from one table to the next. A change bucket and a ticket bucket accompany each item on the tray. To bid on an item, the bidder puts their money (in change) in the change bucket, and also places a numbered ticket in the ticket bucket. For example – to bid on an item marked 10 cents, the minimum bid must comprise a dime placed in the change bucket, and one ticket placed in the ticket bucket. If the guest wants to bid more than the price – whatever multiple of the price is decided, that is the number of tickets that are required. For example, if a bidder wants to double a bid, they would pay 20 cents and use two tickets; to triple a bid – they would pay 30 cents and use three tickets, and so forth. Drawings for Penny Party items are done continually during the event, as soon as each item on a tray has made its way across all tables. If the winning number is not claimed immediately, a second drawing is done for that item. Guests must be present to win. So, start saving your loose change (pennies, nickels, dimes, quarters), if you plan to attend this event.

#### **Donations:**

We are grateful for all of the small items from the 6 different categories (Non-Perishable Food/Beverage Items, Household Items, Paper or Office Items, Pet Supplies, Kids' Items, and Personal Care Items) that have been donated so far. We are still looking for more. These items should be new or nearly new, and small enough to fit on a 9 x 13 tray. Some examples are cans of soup, pasta packages, a box of tissues, pkg of paper plates, small

décor items, dog/cat toys, hand cream, etc. Check out our shelves in the Narthex where donations can be placed. All donations are appreciated!

#### **Volunteers Needed:**

We will need volunteers to help on the day of the event with such tasks as selling food, making baked goods, selling tickets, set up prior to the event, and break down after the event. Look for sign up sheets in the near future in the narthex. Any time that you can give is welcome.

We are always looking for more people to join this committee. Please speak to any one of our members. #### **AMID LIFE'S STORMS**

The hurricanes that battered the East Coast in fall 2024 also battered my soul. I was over the rain and humidity. I was tired of lugging my two preschoolers through the downpours and driving through flash floods at night. Yet I had no reason to complain. Our house was still standing, with no damage.

The news around us was worrying and heartbreaking. "What if that was us?" I wondered. "Would I be strong enough?"

Then the kids asked to play outside. Even though I knew they'd get wet and muddy, I gave in. When a rainbow appeared, I'd never been more humbled as I remembered: I don't need to be anxious. I don't need to be strong enough. God watches over us all. He knows the hurt and sorrow. And he promises to be "our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble" (Psalm 46:1, ESV).

Lord, forgive my unbelief. "Hear my cry, O God ... when my heart is faint. Lead me to the rock that is higher than I" (Psalm 61:1-2, ESV).

#### **FASTING AND FEASTING**

During Lent, consider this practical — and biblical — advice from Arthur Lichtenberger, a former presiding bishop of the Episcopal Church:

- Fast from criticism, and feast on praise.
- Fast from self-pity, and feast on joy.
- Fast from ill-temper, and feast on peace.
- Fast from resentment, and feast on contentment.
- Fast from jealousy, and feast on love.
- Fast from pride, and feast on humility.
- Fast from selfishness, and feast on service.
- Fast from fear, and feast on faith.

#### TWO-WAY BENEFITS

"When you do nothing, you feel overwhelmed and powerless," observed Connecticut politician Pauline Keezer. "But when you get involved, you feel the sense of hope and accomplishment that comes from knowing you are working to make things better." Indeed, it's impossible to shine light in someone else's life without lighting up your own.

We might think being generous toward another with our time or possessions leaves us with less. But as Jesus said, "Whoever loses their life for my sake will find it" (Matthew 10:39, NIV). How common it is that when we minister to others in Christ's name, we find we have also — or perhaps even more so — received ministry. This is the miracle of God's love at work.

#### ON THE PATH TO VICTORY

After moving to a college town, Pastor Kendra Thompson learned about the athletic phenomenon known as March Madness. And after a nondenominational upbringing, as a young adult she learned about Lenten traditions.

Lent and the NCAA college basketball tournament, which usually coincide, both point to the divine, Thompson argues. "In Lent, with each day we are drawn closer to the crushing reality that we've crucified our God. And yet we are also faced with an impossible victory: that death did not win, that our God is raised in Jesus Christ," she writes. "Likewise, watching college basketball invites us into a season of hoping in unlikely possibilities, marveling at upsets, and giving thanks to God for the connection we find as his people."

Like fans swept up in high-stakes games, Jesus' disciples abandon everything to follow him. Lent might be "holy madness," Thompson muses. It's "an opportunity to 'feel' our religion, not just in our heads but with our skin, our voices, even in the anxieties of our prayers."



# Building Connections, Strengthening Mission: The Impact of Staff Development

Since 2021, when I joined the synod staff, I have felt a deep passion and dedication for the work God is calling me to do. Over the past three years, the relationships I have built, both with synod staff and throughout the synod regions and beyond, have been some of the strongest of my career. I have been a Lutheran all my life, raised in a church and family of faith. So, when the job opened at the synod office, applying felt like a natural choice.



My time on synod staff has shaped my spiritual journey, revealing how God's presence is truly in everyone, including me, in both joyful and challenging times. I often find myself asking, "What is God calling us to do?" "What is God calling me to do?" It's funny how sometimes God's answers are loud and clear, while other times, there seems to be silence, much like a parent stepping back to let a child solve a puzzle or get dressed all on their own.

However, God is not silent in the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod. God is actively working through all of us to move mountains and embody the change Jesus modeled for us. The synod staff have been focusing more intentionally on communication and staff development. Over the past year, the full synod staff, including building staff and the Associates of the Bishop, have gathered for retreats to strengthen our communication. One of these retreats also included the Synod Council, the redesign team, and other key stakeholders around the synod, providing a space for collaboration. Pastor Doug Hill from Abiding Hope in Littleton, Colorado, has helped facilitate some of these retreats, incorporating insights from the Gaining Strength cohorts. Through this work, staff have explored their enneagram numbers, gaining a deeper understanding of how our personalities intertwine and complement one another.

Pastor Rachael Dietz, Associate to the Bishop, comments on the retreat by saying, "Intentional investment



in staff help us grow into the disciples God would have us be. We're not static blobs; we're human beings with hearts, hands, feet, and brains. When we practice and learn, we become more aligned and attuned to the Spirit's work in us and the synod. Your mission support then gets turned inside out as we support the mission of congregations: to proclaim Jesus, crucified and risen, to all."

This investment in staff development is not just about strengthening our internal team, it is about equipping us to better serve the entire synod. As we grow in communication, collaboration, and leadership, we become more responsive to the needs of the congregations, more effective in our ministries, and more connected as a community of faith. By modeling teamwork and intentional growth, we hope to inspire congregations and leaders to do the same in their own contexts. Ultimately, this work is about aligning ourselves more fully with God's call, ensuring that together, as one synod, we continue to move mountains and embody the change Christ has set before us.

We would like to extend our gratitude to Trinity Lutheran Church in Lehighton and St. John's Lutheran Church in Allentown for hosting staff retreats. Your hospitality is deeply appreciated and truly a blessing.

#### A Stuffed Cloud of Witnesses

Ash

We are skidding off the map. We make a hole in the air as we fall.

The air is stuffed with ash each time an F-16 drops its bombs on cemeteries.

Dear Lehigh Mission District,

"Earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust."<sup>2</sup>. We hear these words at funeral services in the cemetery. Sand is poured on the casket by the presiding minister to symbolize ashes and shaped in the form of a cross.

As we approach Ash Wednesday, another Christian ritual is the imposition of ashes on our foreheads. We are reminded by these words in that ritual: "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

Ashes are smeared on the foreheads of believers with the sign of the cross. We are reminded by the impositions of ashes that we are dust and as dust we shall return to the ground.

Now take the words from the poem above, "The air is stuffed with ash." These ashes are not placed on a casket or smeared on someone's forehead.

These ashes are inhaled because they are in the air. These ashes irritate the eyes because they are flying in the air. These ashes cover the protagonist and their companion's entire bodies because they are stuffed in the air.

The pilot's F-16 bombs show an indifference to beliefs, faiths, and confessions. The bombs aim to desecrate the cemeteries of the dead. In the process, bombs target to maim the human spirit from the living.

Who is really "skidding off the map"?5

Regardless of our ecumenical or inter-religious traditions, cemeteries hold the faithful departed. Cemeteries are filled with the living hope of their testimonies from every faith.
